Key Question: To what extent should we embrace globalization?

In SS10-1 you will explore multiple perspectives on the origins of globalization and the local, national, and international impacts of globalization on land, people, cultures, identity, and citizenship. Through completing this course you will discover the answers to the following questions: How does globalization impact your identity? What historical impacts has globalization created? How sustainable is globalization? How should you respond as a citizen to globalization

4. Complete every question in the paper Assignment Booklet.
5. Editing and final drafts are more than just rewriting your rough draft. Take the time to ensure that all ideas are built in a proper essay format.
6. Use the **Course Reference Guide** often, even if you think you know what is expected, check anyway. It may help remind you of specific requirements.
